Get Ready for Our Green & Bake Sale


In preparation for our December 7-8 Green & Bake Sale, four workshops are scheduled. The first is this month, see * above. The others are:


Plant Facts - Plants to Avoid



Poison Ivy

This plant secrets a sticky oil that causes itchy, painful blisters and the oil can be carried into your home by your pets. Remember the old saying, "Leaves of three; let it be." The plant's leaflets grow off of the main stem in groups of three, rather than the five common to similar backyard plants. Other tips are the plants white berries and hairy vines.

Pokeweed (American Nightshade)





This plant has white blooms that resemble Queen Anne's lace. But it has a smooth stem dappled with purple spots, not a hairy green stem. Poison when eaten. It can cause vomiting and death.

Giant Hogwood

This is the worst of the poison plants. This invasive plant can grow higher than 10 feet. It has huge lobed leaves and white umbrella like flower clusters. It's sap causes horrible blisters and burns.
