Interesting Plant Facts



White Pine

Pine is one of the most common building woods in New England. Homes from the days of the colonists were built from this lumber. President George Washington used pine for his floors at Mount Vernon.

Before the American Revolution, white pine was in high demand in Britain. King George III claimed ownership of all large American white pines. This infuriated the colonists, as they needed these trees for their own building projects. In fact, the tree was so important to them that the first colonial flag featured a white pine in the upper left corner. During that time rebellious colonists planked the floors of their homes with white pine in defiance of the British King.
