#### Photography is painting with light.

Think about the story you are trying to tell with the picture.







**The best light for photography is early morning or late afternoon.** (Pat: Or right after it has rained.)

Know where your light is coming from.

Don't be afraid to get close.



Composition begins by seeing your photo as a grid. What is right in the middle is often static & less dynamic.

Sometimes you just have to wait for it!

#### Interesting Plant Facts

#### Amaranth Seeds are a NASA Winner

Amaranth is a native to North America. It has been a cultivated grain for 8,000 years. It is a rich source of protein. This nutritional food is especially good for pregnant women and children. The folks at NASA know its value and recommend Amaranth as one of the most nutritional foods to be taken on space missions.

Amaranth seeds are easy to cook and tasty. Young Amaranth leaves are also delicious in salads. Native Americans have been eating Amaranth seeds for thousands of years. To this day, Amaranth grains are toasted much like popcorn and mixed with honey, molasses, or chocolate to make a treat called *alegría*, meaning *joy* in Spanish.
