### Brilliant Fall Color

Want that brilliant fall color and you don't want those invasive euonomyous' (burning bush), then plant our native sumac. Sumac is a shrub or small tree with the ability to survive in our soils and climate. It's a great stabilizer and a great haven for birds. It does spread and colonize through an underground root system but it is a crowd pleaser in the fall.

## Weston Nurseries goes native

Grow Native recently had a workshop at Weston Nurseries in Hopkington, MA, introducing attendees to their new 'Weston Rewinding" program As they celebrate their 100th anniversary they are launching their Sustainability Program. This is 1) looking at their Ecosystem carbon footprint; 2) Operations, and how to reduce the amount of water and how they water all their plants, where their plants come from including regarding distant and transportation, and 3) potting soil, using peat free option and composted peanut hulls.



# Tips for what to do in the Garden

Drill holes in tree stumps and fill with dirt to hasten rotting

Drain hoses and scrub tools and treat surfaces to prevent rusting

Leave ornamental grasses intact for winter interest and wildlife cover

Sínk pots of unplanted perenníals ínto vegetable garden or shelter under píles of leaves

Most lawns do not requíre addítíonal nítrogen feeding

Move houseplants that are dropping leaves into more sun

Mulch garlic before ground freezes

wait to prune shrubs and trees until after leaves drop

LEAVE THE LEAVES, in your gardens for all the winter critters and only rake from the lawns.

Remember those sprays for ticks and mosquitos also kill beneficial insects so please don't spray the environment, spray yourselves with cedercide or other herbal remedies.

## Garden visit of the Month

Several weeks ago, I took a day trip to the most spectacular dahlia garden! Located on Long Island Sound just off the coast of Mystic CT, Ender's Island is home to the St. Edmund's Retreat Center.

This 11 acre sanctuary is open to the public 7 days a week, free of charge, accessible by a causeway and has plenty of parking. The drive took under 2 hours and was well worth the trip!

There are 24 plots with over 2000 dahlias of 400 varieties. All of the plants are beautifully staked and labeled. There were also lots of butterflies in the gardens. Peak bloom is mid August through mid September though many of the varieties continue to bloom until the first frost. It was the most amazing display of colors!

The property also has a lovely rose garden, many fruit trees and a natural rock amphitheater with many plantings nestled in the rocks. The stone buildings, walkways and walls further enhance the beauty of the sweeping ocean views.
