Bourne Library's new Pollinator Garden

Our Club strives to fulfill its mission to provide educational information for the public on all things gardens both in print and in practice. To that end, we joined with the Pollinator Pathway Cape Cod and designed, installed, and are maintaining our first pollinator garden located in front of the Jonathan Bourne Library.

The installation took place this past spring. We were lucky that the area, 350 square feet, was somewhat ready for planting but we did have to deal with about 50% of it covered in weeds. Six club members completed the weeding, layout, installation, and mulching in about 3 hours.

We'll continue to water this new garden very well the first year, but once it's established less watering will be required.

The finishing touch will be signage identifying the plants and the Club for our efforts. It will be created this winter and placed in the garden in the spring. The Library's website will include a listing of the plants in the garden as well.

Approximately 100 plants, both native and non-native loved by pollinators, were installed. They include at least 20 species and many varieties. A partial plant list is provided below:

Agastache (Anise Hyssop); Amsonia (Blue Star Flower); Asclepius (Milkweed); Aster Baptisia (False Indigo): Coreopsis (Tickseed): Crocosmia (Fire Lily): Dicentra (Bleeding Heart): Echinacea (Coneflower); Eupatorium (Joe Pye Weed); Iris Cristata; Liatris (Gayfeather); Lobelia (Cardinal Flower); Monarda (Bee Balm); Nepeta (Catmint); Solidago (Goldenrod); Rudbeckia (Black-eyed Susan); Cornus (red twig dogwood); Hypericum (St. John's wort)

Please visit the garden, particularly when it's in flower and buzzing with bees and butterflies. It looks amazing.

PULL TAB PROJECT

Our Club has been participating in this program for many years. For those of you new to the Pull-Tab Project, here is some background. Shriners Hospitals for Children, located throughout North America, have been serving children with complex and specialized healthcare needs since 1922. These include orthopedic and neuromuscular conditions and burn injuries to name just a few.

As part of that commitment, all care and services are provided regardless of a family's ability to pay or insurance status. We are indeed fortunate to have a Shriners Hospital in Springfield, MA.

Individual MA Clubs bring their tabs to the Garden Club Federation of Massachusetts' (GCFM) meetings or to the Waltham office. Those collected are then delivered to GCFM's Tab Coordinator to be delivered to the Shriners in Springfield.

The Shriner's accept these aluminum pull-tabs donations to provide care and the research to accomplish its mission. The tabs from our garden clubs are collected with other tab donations at the Shriners Hospital in Springfield. Periodically a metal recycling company collects them and converts the weight collected to the prevailing value for aluminum and converts that into dollars for pediatric equipment, child life programs, or whatever are the current needs.

SO APTUCXET MEMBERS PLEASE START/KEEP POPPING THOSE BEVERAGE CAN TABS (no soup, tuna, food or can tabs they are not aluminum) AND BRING THEM TO MEETINGS WHERE THEY'LL BE COLLECTED AND DELIVERED TO GCFM.
