Aptucxet Garden Club Meeting Sep 09,2024 **Fragrant and Peony Gardens**

Donelle is a Master Gardener of 10 years and specializes in Garden design. Her presentation was very informative with fabulous pictures! What a treat. She discussed the Fragrant Garden with an added presentation on Peonies.

The Fragrant Garden presentation covered a host of plants that offered amazing fragrances with specifics, where to plant, how to plant, pros/cons, and special care for each variety that was showcased. Donelle also provided alternatives for the members of specific varieties in some cases re: the "Edith Bogue" Southern Magnolia that can grow to 60 feet tall! The Dwarf Magnolia's only grow to 20 feet tall and have other attributes that might make them more acceptable to plant in our gardens. She gave standard favorites for consideration. Additionally, we were able to view pictures of her fabulous gardens.

The Peony presentation allowed our membership to learn about three types of peonies. Herbaceous also known as bush peonies, Itoh (Intersectional) peonies that are a graft of herbaceous and tree peonies, and Tree Peonies. We learned the how, when, and where of these three types with general planting requirements with an emphasis on how depth requirements, bloom types noting the type of peony that they are seen in, some that are fragrant, all with lovely pictures and names for our enjoyment.

To wrap up her presentation was a question/answer session with note of the 2025 Hydrangea Tour July 20-25.2025.

As a newcomer in this club and I am always amazed at the level of information, expertise and beauty of the many variety and species that are discussed during our meetings. I am a grateful learner and look forward to the many offerings that are provided.

The program for the evening meeting on Wednesday, October 16, 2024, will be a Long-Lasting Fall Arrangement Workshop with Anna Holmes. This workshop is for members only. Participants will create a dried arrangement in a sugar pumpkin using flowers, pods, filler, vines and other fall dried items. You will be able to transition your design from the pumpkin to another container to be able to use your creation for Thanksgiving. This will be a fun, relaxing workshop loaded with design tips.

There is no fee to participate in this workshop, and the dried materials will be provided, however, each participant will need to bring the following:

- A sugar pumpkin, no wider than 8", any shape, hollowed out, a hole cut in the top (save the top and stem of the pumpkin, if the stem falls off, save it).
- A 16 oz plastic container that will fit inside the pumpkin. The hole in the top of the pumpkin should be the size of the plastic container.
- A pair of clippers.

How to Create Your Very Own Homegrown National Park

Our guest speaker, Neal Sanders, humorously regaled us with the "true story of how two people came to create an astonishing garden, lived to tell about it, and are still married". Over time their experiences included adventures in careers, multiple moves, and homes with various stages of gardens.

Betty Sanders, Neil's wife, had grown up with gardens and gardening. She transitioned from her current occupation to taking courses in horticulture and becoming a Master Gardener. She expanded her core knowledge base with courses in Hydrology progressing into environmental landscape design.

Settling back in the Boston area, a perfect piece of land was purchased with many known challenges. The ultimate goal was to build their dream home and to keep most rainwater on the property and keep water flowing to the wetlands without contaminants. This was accomplished through use of perforated drains to carry water to the garden and wetlands, rain barrels to capture water for garden use, and no asphalt or expanses of non-perking stone. Ultimately, they created their dream home, planted their anchor trees, no grass, walkways, and surrounding native plants. Over the years the primarily native-plant garden has matured into a stunning example of how beauty, low maintenance, and environmental sustainability can go hand-in-hand resulting in the development of their own homegrown National Park.



Below please find helpful Pollinator Pathway information found in the Buzz Fall Newsletter such as Keystone Plants and Soft Landings:

Keystone plants are native plants that support a significant number of caterpillars (butterfly and moth larvae). Planting keystone plants helps build complex food webs by forming the essential foundation —native plants and insects — that provide food for other organisms, directly and indirectly

What are Soft Landings?

Soft landings are diverse native plantings under keystone trees (or any other regionally appropriate native tree). These plantings provide critical shelter and habitat for one or more life cycle stages of moths, butterflies, and beneficial insects such as bumble bees, fireflies, lacewings, and beetles. In addition to plants, soft landings also include leaf litter, duff, and plant debris.

Sunflower Spectacle

It was such a spectacular season for sunflowers this year. From late July through September these magnificent plants have been **producing** flowers, some of them over 12 inches in diameter and over 10 feet high! Each blossom has thousands of tiny florets at the center that develop into seeds. In addition to its aesthetic beauty, the sunflower has been used as a source of food, oil and dyes for hundreds of years. It is heliotropic, meaning that the flowers follow the sun from East to West to maximize photosynthesis. Once the flowers mature, they tend to face East permanently in order to attract pollinators in the morning. The sunflower is a stunning symbol of joy, hope and loyalty.

I was fortunate to visit several sunflower farms and gardens this past summer. One of the most impressive was Colby Farm in Newbury, MA. The farm hosts a Sunflower Festival for one week each year, usually late August/early September to coincide with peak bloom of their crop. A few photos are attached below. The farm is located just minutes off of Rt 95 North and parking is \$10. It is very popular so plan to arrive early. Details and dates are posted on their website, www.colbyfarms.com.

Closer to home, Tony Andrews Farm in East Falmouth offers U-Pick Sunflowers at their expansive fields. It's a great place for photography! The farm also offers U-Pick strawberries earlier in the season and it has a well-stocked farm stand with local fruits and vegetables. This Fall the farm will offer lots of fun activities for families including hayrides and pumpkin picking. Go to their website at www.tonyandrews-farm.com for more information.


