Aptucxet Garden Club of Bourne: Joint meeting Nov. 6, 2024

Program: Native Plants for Cape Cod

Speaker: Fran Raleigh

Native Plants for Cape Cod was our program presented by Fran Raliegh, Ph.D. in Plant Science (Ecology) and Master Gardener. Her presentation slides and hand-outs gave an overview of native plantings, and the support the native plants offer to insects, birds and other animals on Cape Cod, what "native" means and well as the benefits of landscaping with native plants.

She provided examples of both Meadow and Grassland and Woodland habitats. Identification of native plants, Sundial Lupine and Yellow wild Indigo, that support only single hosts such as blue butterflies (Sundial Lupine) and a special bee, Walsh's Anthophora, (Yellow Wild Indigo). Plants that are fire dependent which require fire to germinate their seeds or maintain their health. Fire-adapted plants regenerate from protected buds that are in the deep root systems and large trunk bases called burls.

What is an "invasive" plant? A plant that is spread by the fauna of the area. Bittersweet and Burning bush are examples. Birds eat the berries of the plants, fly away and in another location will defecate the seed pulp that then grows with the cycle perpetuated over the seasons.

The final take-away was insightful despite appearing common sense.

- Make sure you have the right plant and the right place.
- Native plants support the local ecosystem, may tolerate animals and harsh conditions, and are beautiful and important!

Fran's extensive knowledge is evident and her enthusiasm apparent in the many examples she provided and pictures of her gardens with ditties of how her gardens have grown.

Budget isn't a bad word; there are many reasons to spend less: New gardener not yet committed to investment Other priorities like travel and fine dining Just enjoy the challenge of spending less

Major expense categories are Supplies, Equipment, Plants

Supplies

Stop using expensive lawn chemical fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides
Embracing a Cape Cod lawn helps protect our single source aquifer
Saves insects because pesticides are non-selective
Saves birds from ingesting second-hand poisons
Use top dressing in place of fertilizer (learn more at May meeting)
Lime – Locally-owned stores \$11 vs big box \$5.50/40 lb. bag
Learn more about soil chemistry at Darlene's talk in April

Equipment

Estate sales Hand tools are \$1; leave them around because there are more in the shed! No Felco pruners at estate sales, however ^(C) Larger tools are \$5; good for rarely used tools like post diggers and pitchforks, Old tools are sturdier Find stately garden furniture and yard art

Every pot and garden item ever sold at Job Lot ends up there Helps the environment by keeping stuff out of landfills Now through December is the time to collect shallow mum pots for our Plant Sale! Dump is also a great source for wood chips, bricks, steppingstones, and compost

<u>NOT ACCEPTED</u>: Lights attached to artificial trees or lighted decorations, such as stars, angels or other fixtures.
